#### CASA is an acronym for Court Appointed Special Advocates

#### How Did CASA Begin?

- In 1976 Judge David Soukup of Seattle, WA wanted more information on the children appearing in his courtroom
- In 1977 community volunteers were trained and a pilot program started





- 939 Programs in the United States
- 97,900 Dedicated Volunteers
- 242,000 Children Served Annually


### Local CASA Programs

- We Recruit, Screen, Train and Support Volunteers
- We Provide 30 hours of pre-service training with the National CASA curriculum
- We offer volunteers monthly in-service trainings
- We support volunteers as they advocate



• We raise the revenue to support the work

# Membership with Nebraska and National CASA




- We are governed by a state CASA statute.
- We must pass the National CASA Association Standards
- We are required to have more than 1 staff for every 30 volunteers
- We must be trained in National CASA's Training of Facilitators

# Who Can Become a CASA Volunteer?

- NE State Law & National CASA Standards require a volunteer:
- Be 21 years or older
- Complete an application, interview, and reference check
- Have a comprehensive background check
- Complete 30 hours of preservice training




#### **A CASA Volunteer**



- Sworn in by the Judge as a "Friend of the Court"
- Advocates for the best interests of an abused or neglected child in court
- Visits the child frequently
- Meets with all people involved; foster parents, parents, case workers, teachers, doctors


### **A CASA Volunteer**

- Submits report to the Court with information and recommendations for the child
- Attends court hearings
- Advocates for the child until the child is returned home or placed in a permanent placement or adopted
