Commission History

[Legislative Resolution 37](#) called for the Health and Human Services Committee to “review, investigate and assess the effect of the child welfare reform initiative implemented by the Department of Health and Human Services.” This [investigation](#) found several areas that needed attention.

In 2012, the Nebraska Children’s Commission was created with the passing of [LB821](#). Responsibilities assigned to the Commission included the following:

- Create a statewide strategic plan for reform of the child welfare system programs and services,
- Review the operations of DHHS regarding child welfare programs and services.
- Recommend, either by the establishment of a new division within DHHS or establishment of a new state agency, options for attaining the intent of this act.
- Provide a permanent forum for collaboration among state, local, community, public and private stakeholders in child welfare programs and services.

Over the years, additional tasks have been assigned and membership representation has increased. Most significantly, the Commission’s scope has expanded to include both the child welfare and juvenile justice systems. There have also been additional subgroups brought under the umbrella of the Commission. These groups are outlined in the [Commission Subgroup Structure](#) section of this packet.

The original sunset date of the Nebraska Children’s Commission was June 30, 2014. The date was extended in 2013, again in 2016 by [LB746](#) until June 30, 2019, and the sunset provision was removed in 2019 by LB600.

Commission Subgroup Structure

The Commission currently has 20 different subgroups that are active. Below are all of the groups with outlined term limits either in statute or the Governance and Organizational Structure document.

- Nebraska Children’s Commission.....Governor’s discretion
- Juvenile Services Committee (JSC).....2-year terms
- Alternative Response (AR) Advisory Committee.....2-year terms
- Strengthening Families Act (SFA) Committee.....2-year terms

The Commission created subgroups to work on specific issues. Some groups have fluid membership and do not have term limits.

- Bridge to Independence (B2I) Advisory Subcommittee.....2-year terms
- Foster Care Reimbursement Rate Subcommittee (FCRRS).....4-year terms

Commission workgroups can be archived and called upon at a later date if needed. Examples of these groups include:

- Workforce Workgroup
- Legal Parties Taskforce
- Structure Taskforce
- Legislative Review Workgroup

Many of these groups have broken down their assigned tasks into additional subgroups to allow for in-depth discussion and research. Meeting Schedules

Commission Meetings

The Commission typically meets quarterly on Tuesday of the designated month. Up to 50% of meetings may occur virtually with the Open Meetings Act requirements and at the discretion of the Executive Committee. The Commission may add additional meetings during the year should a need arise. Meetings commonly occur in Lincoln but can branch out into the greater Nebraska area. New locations that offer an educational opportunity for the Commission are welcome for suggestion. Members are expected to attend all meetings of the Commission.

Second Tier Subgroup Meetings

Second tier subgroups meet at the frequency necessitated by the action of the Committee. This has typically resulted in quarterly meetings. Meetings for these groups are often scheduled through the use of an online attendance survey to verify that a majority of members, or quorum, can attend a prospective meeting date.

Third Tier Subgroup Meetings

Third tier subgroups have no annual meeting requirements and can vary in frequency depending on the assigned tasks and timelines of the group. Third tier subgroup meetings are commonly scheduled through an online attendance survey.

Commission and Subgroup Membership

Member Responsibilities

As a member of the Nebraska Children's Commission and/or its subgroups, you play an important role in ensuring that it holds true to its vision statement:

TO IMPROVE THE SAFETY AND WELL-BEING OF ALL CHILDREN AND FAMILIES IN NEBRASKA.

The Commission will approve a set of bylaws which establish the policies and procedures of the Commission and will assist in clarifying the expectations of its members. This document is referred to as the "Governance and Organizational Structure" memo.

Expense Reimbursement

Members appointed to the Commission and the statutory Committees are entitled to reimbursement of the travel costs to attend meetings. Lodging may also be provided for members traveling large distances to attend meetings. Lodging is arranged for members by staff. Copies of the expense reimbursement explanation and form are available on the Commission website at: <https://childrens.nebraska.gov/MemberResources.html>. Forms should be completed and submitted with a Mapquest or Google Map verifying the miles traveled, supporting receipts, and agendas for meetings attended. Completed form should be submitted to the Commission's Administrative Programs Officer for processing.

Membership Composition

Commission Membership

The Nebraska Children's Commission has 15 voting members and 11 Ex-Officio members as defined in [Neb. Rev. Stat. §43-4202](#).

Commission voting members are appointed at the discretion of the Governor, generally for a two-year term. If applicable, information about the reapplication process will be provided to members.

Second-Tier Committee Membership

Membership appointments of second tier subgroup can vary depending on statute and/or at Commission discretion. Committees with specific statutory membership positions outlined include the Alternative Response Committee ([Neb. Rev. Stat. §28-712](#)), Juvenile Services Committee ([Neb. Rev. Stat. §43-4203](#)), and the Strengthening Families Act Committee ([Neb. Rev. Stat. §43-4218](#)).

The remaining second-tier subgroups consist of workgroups, taskforces, and subcommittees created by the Commission. The Bridge to Independence Advisory Subcommittee and the Foster Care Reimbursement Rate Subcommittee have recommended membership positions. Other subgroups have open membership to any interested parties. All subgroups are created with the goal of a balanced membership. As such, the Chairpersons of the second-tier subgroups and Executive Committee of the Commission may implement membership guidelines to ensure subgroups have adequate representation.

Third-Tier Subgroup Membership

Third tier subgroups consist of subcommittees, taskforces, and workgroups. These groups have open membership to any interested parties. All subgroups are created with the goal of a balanced membership. As such, the Chairpersons of the third-tier subgroups and Executive Committee of the Commission may implement membership guidelines to ensure subgroups have adequate representation. No workgroup, subcommittee or task force may consist of a quorum of the parent body's voting membership. In other words, no more than half of the voting members of a Committee may serve on a workgroup.

Strategic Priorities

The Nebraska Children's Commission is required to determine three to five strategic child welfare priorities for research or policy development for each biennium. In determining the strategic child welfare priorities, the commission must take into consideration the findings and recommendations of the annual reports of the Foster Care Review Office and Office of Inspector General for Child Welfare, and the federal Child and Family Services Review. ([Neb. Rev. Stat. §43-4204](#)).

Strategic Priorities identified in 2023:

1. Placement Stability and Solutions
 - Provide recommendations to increase the level of support available to relative and kinship placements
2. Service Array
 - Identify what new or innovative evidence-based practices could be implemented in the State of Nebraska to improve placement stability
3. Prevention Continuum
 - Create recommendations on how to better educate the people of Nebraska about services available for families and children

Additionally, NCC is committed to valuing diversity, equity, and inclusion as well as family voice. The Commission recognizes its responsibility to create a collaborative environment for all individuals of Nebraska in order to promote meaningful dialogue that will influence change within the child welfare and juvenile justice systems.

The strategic plan was updated in 2023 due to various membership and staff transitions; progress is being tracked and discussed at each Commission meeting.

Statutory Reports

The Nebraska Children's Commission shall annually provide a written report to the Governor and an electronic report to the Health and Human Services Committee of the Legislature defining its strategic child welfare priorities and progress toward addressing such priorities, summarizing reports from each committee and subcommittee of the commission, and making recommendations on or before September 1 of each year. The commission shall present a summary of such report in an annual public hearing before the Health and Human Services Committee of the Legislature on or before December 1 of each year.

Workflow

Operations Tools

There are a number of tools created by Commission staff to assist the subgroups in their work. Tools include a charter template, a template for proposing recommendations to the Commission, a matrix to assist in determining if projects are within the scope of the Commission, and a standard form for use in providing updates of subgroup activities to the Commission.

Recommendation and Report Approval Process

All formal recommendations and reports must receive Commission approval. As mentioned under the Statutory Reports section, reports or updates are completed annually by all Commission committees.

All committees and subgroups need to form their recommendations and timelines with the Commission schedule in mind. Most statutory Committees will meet 2-6 weeks prior to the August Commission meeting. This means that groups should plan to have any final work products ready for review around June or July of each year.

Commission Website

The Commission has a website that is available at www.childrens.nebraska.gov. This website will prove to be a valuable resource for members. The website is host to many resources including current meeting materials, past meeting materials, a calendar of meeting activities, summaries and member listings for the Commission and each subgroup, past publications and reports, and membership openings.

The website is maintained by Commission staff, and suggestions for edits are welcome.

Financing Primer

In 2015 the Commission released the Nebraska Child Welfare Financing Primer as an educational document on the sources and purposes of expenditures in Nebraska's child welfare system. The Primer provides a comprehensive picture of how the state uses federal and state funds to support children and families involved in the child welfare system. Child welfare funding is complex, and the Primer is designed to explain the major sources of funding available, the extent to which Nebraska leverages those funding streams, and how federal and state dollars work together to achieve core child welfare outcomes. The Primer was written and researched by ChildFocus, Inc. in collaboration with an advisory board of Nebraska child welfare experts. It was funded through the generous support of the Sherwood Foundation.

Blueprint Report

The Nebraska Child Welfare Blueprint Report is another educational document created by ChildFocus Inc. that was released by the Commission. The 2017 document outlines the progress of Nebraska relating to child welfare issues as well as the necessary areas for continued attention. The ideas contained in the report reflect an overarching consensus in Nebraska and nationally that child welfare agencies operate in a larger system that depends on partnerships across multiple state agencies, private providers, legal systems, and community organizations.
