



Exclusionary Criteria

- 1. Physical Abuse of a child
 - (i) to the head or torso of a child; or
 - (ii) that results in a bodily injury; or
 - (iii) with a disability;
- 2. **Domestic violence** involving a caretaker in situations in which the alleged perpetrator has access to the child or caretaker;
- 3. **Sexual abuse, sexual assault, or sexual exploitation**, including acts prohibited by Neb. Rev. Stat. §§ 28-318, 28-319.01, 28-320, 28-320.01, 28-320.02, 28-322.01, 28-322.02, 28-322.04, 28-322.05, 28-703, 28-707(d), and 28-367.01;
- 4. Sex trafficking of a child as defined in Neb. Rev. Stat. §§ 28-830(14) and 28-831(3);
- 5. **Neglect of a minor child that results in serious bodily injury** as defined in Neb. Rev. Stat. § 28-109, requires hospitalization of the child, or results in an injury to the child that requires ongoing medical care, behavioral health care, or physical or occupational therapy, including a growth delay, which may be referred to as failure to thrive, that has been diagnosed by a physician and is due to parental neglect;
- 6. An allegation that requires a forensic interview at a child advocacy center, coordination with Law Enforcement, or coordination with the child abuse and neglect investigation team pursuant to Neb. Rev. Stat. § 28-728;
- 7. A household member allegedly caused the **death of a child**;
- 8. Newborn whose urine or meconium tested positive for alcohol and whose Caretaker (i) has an alcohol addiction; or (ii) previously delivered a drug-exposed infant and did not successfully complete drug treatment; or (iii) did not prepare for the newborn's birth; or (iv) currently uses controlled substances as defined by Neb. Rev. Stat. § 28-401 or alcohol AND breastfeeds or expresses intent to breastfeed; or (v) has no in-home support system or alternative primary care arrangements;
- 9. Household member uses or manufactures methamphetamine or other controlled substances as defined in Neb. Rev. Stat. §§ 28-401 and 28-405;
- 10. A pregnant woman who has tested positive for methamphetamine or other controlled substances as defined in Neb. Rev. Stat. §§ 28-401 and 28-405;
- 11. A child who has had contact with methamphetamine or other controlled substance as defined in Neb. Rev. Stat. §§ 28-401 and 28-405 including a positive meconium or hair follicle screen or test;
- 12. A child resides with a household member whose parental rights have been terminated or relinquished during a court-involved case;
- 13. Abuse or neglect of a child who resides with (i) the subject of an active **Traditional Response**; or (ii) an individual or family that is **receiving services through the DCFS Protection and Safety**

section; or (iii) an individual or family who is **involved in a juvenile court petition** pursuant to Neb. Rev. Stat. § 43-247(3)(a);

- 14. **Out-of-home** child abuse or neglect;
- 15. A household member has a prior court substantiated report of child abuse or neglect OR is a sex offender;
- 16. A Household Member appears on the **central registry** of child protection cases under Neb. Rev. Stat. § 28-720;
- 17. A child under the age of two or at least two children under the age of five reside(s) with a household member where the current maltreatment concerns are the same as prior maltreatment concerns:
- 18. Caretaker's identity or whereabouts are unknown; Absence of a caretaker without having given an alternate caregiver authority to make decisions and grant consents for necessary care, treatment, and education of a child or without having made provision to be contracted to make such decisions or grant such consents;
- 19. Law enforcement has **cited** a Caretaker for the child abuse or neglect alleged in the Intake Accepted for Assessment;
- 20. An allegation being investigated by a law enforcement agency at the time of assignment;
- 21. A safety concern is otherwise identified which requires Department intervention within 24 hours;
- 22. **Murder** in the first or second degree as defined in Neb. Rev. Stat. § 28-303 or 28-304 or **manslaughter** as defined in Neb. Rev. Stat. § 28-305;
- 23. **Assault** in the first, second, or third degree or assault by **strangulation or suffocation** as defined in Neb. Rev. Stat. §§ 28-308, 28-309, 28-310, or 28-310.01;
- 24. Labor trafficking of a minor as defined by Neb. Rev. Stat. § 28-830
- 25. For a report involving an infant, a household member tests positive for methamphetamine or non-prescribed opioids at the birth of such infant.

RED Team Criteria & Definitions:

- 1. A caretaker has a **significant mental health diagnosis** AND the reporting party is a physician, mental health or other health care provider;
- 2. A caretaker **exhibits symptoms related to significant mental illness** including but not limited to psychotic behaviors, delusional behaviors and danger to self or others;
- 3. Caretaker is identified as a current or former state ward:
- 4. The family has had another **Intake Accepted for Assessment within the past six months** AND includes two or more children under the age of five or one child under the age of two;
- 5. The family currently receives an Alternative Response;

- Child abuse or neglect AND alcohol or other mood altering substance use by a Household member AND there are two or more children under the age of five or one child under the age of two;
- 7. **Physical abuse** that does not rise to the level of physical abuse identified in Exclusionary Criteria:
- 8. Household Member or alternate Caregiver noted on the Intake Accepted for Assessment has a history of using or manufacturing methamphetamine or other controlled substances as defined in Neb. Rev. Stat. 28-401 and 28-405;
- 9. **Domestic assault** as defined in Neb. Rev. Stat. § 28-323 or domestic violence in the family home;
- 10. A family member residing in the home or a caregiver that has been the **subject of a report** accepted for traditional response or assigned to alternative response in the past six months;
- 11. Use of alcohol or controlled substances as defined in section 28-401 or 28-405 by a caregiver that **impairs the caregiver**'s ability to care and provide safety for the child.
